Class Builds Skills for Students Wanting to Work with Non-Profits

Pantry relationships with churches, businesses and other groups may last for many years and take many forms. We work with Mount Union for Food Drives, Volunteers, and sometimes classes. Dr. Beth Canfield-Simbro teaches a class in Grants and Planning. I (editor Barb) visited this semester's class in February and discussed the formation of the pantry and my role as grant writer. I offered tips and ideas for future grant writers who will work with non-profits. As part of this class, students select local non-profits and try their hand at grant writing, and through the university's "Pay It Forward" program, they are given money to reward those class members

who were the most successful grant writers. (Last year this class facilitated a new pallet jack for the pantry).

This year's class visited the pantry in late February. Beth, third from the left in the front row, along with members of her class, gave the pantry a good cleaning -- washing walls, chairs and grocery carts; cleaning shelves, ceiling fans and refrigerator units; polishing windows; and vacuuming, sweeping and mopping floors. Each winter we are reminded that when over 400 people a week visit any site, the need for continual cleaning is imperative.
