

BUCKEYE GIRLS STATE ONCE AGAIN RETURNS TO ALLIANCE

Since 2011, Ohio Buckeye Girls State (BGS) delegates have spent a week at Mount Union and it always benefits our pantry. Pat Gates, our board president, talked to the girls assigned to the

Recreational Commission, informing them about the pantry and the support the girls provide.



BGS is a week-long program designed to educate Ohio's young women in the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities of good citizenship. By getting involved in this active hands-on process, BGS delegates learn more about city, county and state government.

All the 474

delegates brought food to donate to the pantry and the 11-girl Parks & Recreation Commission, and two advisors took the food to the pantry on their last day. They delivered 1,280 pounds of food and they helped our volunteers make and fill boxes in preparation for our next opening.

When the pantry was forced to adjust our way of operating because of the Covid pandemic more than two years ago, we had to switch the way we did business to allow for proper social distancing. That meant rather than come into the pantry to "shop," clients now pick up their food outside that had been boxed and collected by volunteers.

To do this we needed a consistent supply of boxes. Thankfully, we discovered McElroy Packaging of Orrville which has supplied us with boxes for the last two years. June 16, 2020 was their first delivery of 2,000 boxes and their most recent was June 21 2022 -- in those two years we have received 22,700, 12x12x10-inch boxes that our trusty volunteers tape, fill and deliver to our clients.
