Our greeters & screeners are a key component to pantry operation

We had 12,942 people stop to pick up food at our Pantry last year and the first people to meet them were our Door Greeters and Screeners.

Greeters meet the clients at the door and collect photo ids, and the two screeners sitting inside in front of their computers to register each visit into PantryTrak, a data insights tool created by food banks and pantries across the country to help pinpoint opportunities to serve our hungry neighbors.

Clients are then given a ticket to present at the next pantry door to receive their cart of food. Clients may receive food every two weeks. The screeners also register new families.

Our data entry supervisor is Jan Horning.

Monday and Tuesday screeners have dedicated their time for nearly 10 years, and the two Wednesday crews have many new volunteers. We couldn't serve our community without them.

Monday greeters and screeners are Jo Van Fossen, Carol Bradway and Judy Douglas; Tuesday we have Pat Gates, Margaret Wise, and Sue Butler; and alternating to register clients on Wednesdays are Jan Horning, Diane Schuller, Veronica Lanzer, Cathy Henderson, Paula Lee, Doug Hendel and Victoria Bonner.
