The bench is made totally from recycled plastic, which we get a lot of, as seen by Bill Sol hauling some out to be recycled.

When Covid first started in 2020, Judy Young, the Lions District Governor, was trying to find a project to keep the clubs active without much personal contact. It was determined that Tyco was willing to accept

plastic from Lions clubs and turn it into benches. To date the Lions have received seven benches and the pantry received one because of our recycling contributions.

At first, 500 pounds of recycled plastic was needed to build a bench, but that has expanded to 1,000 pounds and the Lions are also limited to the number of benches they can get.

The Lions bench is a nice addition since the old wooden picnic table we had there had seen its last days.



This 12th year of Light Up the Lakes held April 5 was a great success and a great service to the people we serve at our pantry.

The annual event, put on by Mount Union's co-ed service fraternity Alpha Phi Omega, sold 234 lanterns that were floated on the Mount Union lakes in memory of a loved one.

In the end, \$2,031.59 was raised for the pantry and 577 pounds of food was collected, as seen here delivered to the pantry by Hanna Scott and Claudia Yahasz.
